LATTICINIO

"Latticinio" is the name given to articles of glass in which a network of milk-white lines appear, crisscrossing between two walls of glass. It is a type of Filigree glassware developed during the sixteenth century by the Venetians.

Latticinio glassware is being produced today on the small island of Murano, only a short distance from Venice. The new examples exhibit a network of milk-white threads, in addition to colorful vertical stripes on a crystal ground. These pieces are sometimes called "Venetian" or "Ribbon Glass."

Plate, 4" square
